1 of Parks and Recreation Support Assistant, a grade 8 and 2 appointing Samantha VanVleet to that job. She will start 3 tomorrow at \$40,657. 4 SUPERVISOR MAHAN: Samantha already works for 5 us. Samantha came on as a typist. The work that she is doing is not typist work. Her job description had to be 7 reviewed for accuracy because she does night programs. She runs some of the programs with Laura Archambault and Elizabeth. It was looked at with Civil Service, and your 9 10 department as well for the grading and accuracy for that 11 type of work. The conclusion was that it's not typist 12 work in this grade. 13 Is that two grades higher, or one? MR. BURICK: She was a great six as a typist. 14 15 She's a grade 8 in this position. 16 MR. KELSEY: This was put off until 2020 so we 17 could budget the funds. 18 SUPERVISOR MAHAN: We knew about it and the 19 concerns were there. She was patient enough to wait 20 until 2020. 21 MS. FUTIA: Is that a new position for this 22 year? 23 SUPERVISOR MAHAN: Yes, she's there, but she 2.4 was there as a typist. So, it's in the 2020 budget. 25 MR. BURICK: It's a new position.

1 SUPERVISOR MAHAN: It is a new position, but 2 the money was put in the 2020 budget. 3 MR. FIELD: How long has she worked here? 4 MR. KELSEY: Two or three years. It might be 5 longer. The position she's vacating -MR. GREEN: 7 doesn't need to be backfilled? SUPERVISOR MAHAN: No. When she started here, I 9 think Laura was up at the Town park. They moved to the 10 Crossings and at the Crossings they do everything there. 11 They do scheduling for the pavilions and things and the 12 programs are there. Everything that comes out of that 13 particular area is there. 14 Their department also does all the summer 15 camps and all that stuff. It's graded where it should 16 be now. 17 MR. MAGGUILLI: We are essentially correcting 18 and out of title situation. 19 Resolution 77B is appointing John McDuff. Jr. 20 to fill a vacancy of Thomas Edwards. He will be 21 permanently promoted to Working Foreman in the Water 22 Department, grade 26. He also will start tomorrow at 23 \$59,752. 2.4 Resolution 77C is filling the vacancy left by 25 Dale Hebert and filling that vacancy with William

Juliano, IV. It's a permanent appointment. The

position is an EMT at \$40,477 starting the 27th.

Resolution 77D is creating a new position of

EMT Captain and putting Jason Barry into that position

out of our Civil Service eligible list effective the

27th at a salary of \$70,753.

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SUPERVISOR MAHAN: Chris, can you explain the rationale as to the savings and the other areas by doing a new position of another Captain?

MR. KOSTYUN: Since we have added over the years and increase in the number of ambulances around during the day, this position allows us to separate some administrative responsibilities with direct field supervision. It should dramatically reduce our officer over-time. With senior Assistant Chiefs, four Captains, we work a ton of overtime. We did some moving around to reduce the over-time expenditures associated with that.

MR. KELSEY: This was also budgeted for 2020.

SUPERVISION MAHAN: It was budgeted for 2020, but that is the rationale for the restructure.

MR. MAGGUILLI: Resolution 78 is the first of two public hearings.

Crystal is here from John Bailey's office.

She will conduct a public hearing on behalf of Latham
Water.

We have a request to extend our sewer area to 273 Watervliet Shaker Road. The expense is \$13,837 that will be paid entirely by the developer.*.

He second public hearing is under 202 of the New York State Town Law. This is a public hearing for proposed improvements and repairs to the River Road Storage and Mohawk View Water Treatment Plant mixing study. The proposal is for \$6.5 million worth of improvements. Again, this will be handled by the Water District Council.

Crystal, you will be doing this?

MS. PECK: Yes.

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MR. MAGGUILLI: Resolution 80 is calling a public hearing on February 6 in relation to the proposed Burns/Whitney sanitary sewer rehab project. The project itself is mentioned briefly and described in the Resolution. It has a potential cost of \$3,025,500.

Again, this would be done by Crystal Peck.

MR. FIELD: I've a question that. Is that all the streets over on Burns/Whitney?

SUPERVISION MAHAN: No. What happened, Rick, is we got request to pave some streets and Burns/Whitney.

Burns/Whitney is one of the oldest neighborhoods, as you know. Looking ahead, our engineers in water and sewer —

- the right thing to do was to check the sanitary sewer

systems and the water lines and everything because we did not want to just put pavement down and then have to dig everything up and repair it. So, it turned out to be a huge, huge project. Before the paving can be done, this project is over \$3 million and it has to be done. They did do some work last year.

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I think water was in there and Chreit, did you do some as well?

The underground work was done and then we were able to pave a few streets last year.

MR. MAGGUILLI: The proposed repairs are all based on the study that was performed by Clough Harbour, the engineers. The Town had retained them sometime last year. It's based on their recommendation that resulted in \$3 million and some change figure.

SUPERINTENDENT MAHAN: The critical message on this particular one is that people think we can just go and just pave any street and do this or that. It doesn't work that way. Everything is very, very costly. In this particular case, you put so many streets — all the little streets you put on a list to be paved and then you find out before you just go and do something that there's a lot of repair that has to be done. So, now we are spending millions and millions of dollars on repairs underground before we can even attempt to pave it. You

will hear comments from people - why don't you just pave the street? What are you waiting for? It doesn't work that way. That \$3 million plus for just this project - we have to come up with that. That money has to come out of Chreit's budget, capital plan or whatever and we have to be able to cover these costs. That's the underground work.

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The paving and stormwater budget is over and above that. That is strictly for the paving and water project.

MR. MAGGUILLI: All we are doing tonight is calling for the public hearing. At the public hearing I'm sure they will have Clough Harbour engineers there to answer questions that you may have. That will be the time whether to approve or disapprove the project, whenever it comes up. Tonight we are just voting on okay, let's have the public hearing.

MS. FUTIA: Is the underground work always checked before going to pave?

SUPERINTENDENT MAHAN: Yes. You try to do as much as you can as more of a wholistic approach so you can find out what's underground and be able to do this and then time everything. With almost 57 square miles that the Town covers, you can't possibly match everything up.

What Chreit does and what John does consistently is the very proactive and they plan ahead. There's a long-term plan in place that Chret has that prioritize projects that at the end of 10 years you would be at a point where you want to be.

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The same thing with water. There is prioritizing done in a number of different ways. They do check to see if there is something they absolutely have to do first or than the paving may have to wait because you can't do it all at once. It's all done basically by prioritizing lots of things that have to be done and what's the most important and how can we avoid the most cost. It's very costly to repair versus putting in brand new. If something breaks down today, you can't wait. You have to fix it. The difference in the cost of new and repair is incredible.

The answer to your question is yes, but it's way more complex than that. We started paving in 2010 and almost the whole Town needed to be done. They gives you perspective on how much needs to be paved. We're way ahead of the curve when you take a look at some of the other municipalities and cities and things like that because we've put a lot in over the years. We pretty much had a number that's - I think it's in the State of the Town. At the end of 2020 for water

1 and sewer will be like \$20 million. It's something 2 like that. 3 MR. VOERG: I gave the number to Sara. I don't 4 recall off the top of my head. 5 MR. MAGGUILLI: It's one of the oldest sewer sections of the Town. 7 SUPERINTENDENT MAHAN: Is a combination of many 8 things that go into it. 9 MS. MURPHY: And they photograph the insides of 10 the pipes. It's extensive. 11 SUPERVISOR MAHAN: This process will go on for 12 this particular project. It's a big area over there and 13 there's a lot of work that has to be done. This is what 14 is programmed regarding Chret's project. 15 MR. MAGGUILLI: Resolution 81 again calls for a 16 public hearing on February 6 at 7 p.m. Again, this is 17 based on the feasibility study conducted by Clough 18 Harbour. It's for the design and construction of a 19 single garage facility located at the Public Ops 20 compound. It's a proposed garage facility to house all 21 necessary personnel and equipment for Pure Waters. The 22 estimated cost is part of the feasibility study; 23 \$6,978,031. 2.4 Chreit, do you want to add anything to that?

Thanks Mike.

MR. VOERG:

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This is an important project for Pure Waters and I would like to offer to the Board and anyone who would like to take a tour of our existing facilities. We operate a crew of 17 people that maintained the 407 miles of sewer pipe and 30 remote facilities throughout the Town. We operate out of two garages basically that are not large enough to even store our equipment and much less our personnel. Our staff has been operating like that for 25 years. They operate off of card tables and chairs that we took out of the dumpster.

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This facility will allow mainly our

Supervisors to actually be able to work in the same
location as their employees so that they can ensure
the jobs that they are being dispatched are being
accomplished properly as well as giving us one central
location to store our equipment and materials. When we
have an emergency, I'm driving 20 minutes to go find a
pump that's up at the Town landfill or down to the
sewer plant to pick up other equipment. When we have a
sewer collapse, we have a very little bit of time to
react in order to maintain our New York State permit.

As you may have seen in Albany Shaker Road, we've got a number of pumps that have been laying there for a few weeks. Those are scattered throughout

the Town. If we have an emergency, the first thing we have to do is drive all over to try to find this equipment, shuffle things around because we are mixed in with the Jighway people. It's very inefficient for our staff to operate that way. We feel like we will be better serving our customers if we can consolidate our operations into one operation.

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SUPERVISOR MAHAN: This is just for this particular motion tonight, but that doesn't mean we're spending - we're trying to get other options to decrease that because that's a lot of money.

MR. VOERG: At the study level were looking at a \$50,000 foot view. How much do we think this might cost? As a move forward toward design, we will refine that cost and get a better handle on exactly how much this facility will cost. The Board will have opportunities to say yes or no as we go along.

So, this first vote is to schedule the public hearing. The second vote we will have the public hearing and then after that, we will proceed to hiring an engineer to refine the design and get a better idea of the cost. We can put that out to bid and get an actual construction cost from a contractor. At that time, the Board will have another opportunity to vote and say yes we are willing to spend that money, or no

1 we are not. This is kind of that progression to kind 2 of get closer to the goal. 3 The Town's salt shed was just bid and that 4 came in at \$2 million -- just for a shed. 5 MR. KELSEY: That's 2.5. MR. VOERG: That's 2.5. I guess in perspective, 7 \$6.9 million for a full garage or 2.5 for a shed -MR. MAGGUILLI: This is supposed to address the 9 Town's needs far into the future, according to the 10 feasibility study. 11 MR. VOERG: Thank you. Yes, Mike. We 12 incorporated room to grow so as the Town grows, we have enough room for additional staff. 13 I will put out an email once we get back up 14 15 and running to anyone who would like to take a tour of 16 our existing facilities and see where we operate. 17 SUPERINTENDENT MAHAN: Thanks, Chreit. 18 MR. MAGGUILLI: Resolution 82 is authorizing 19 Doug to advertise for bids for a new trench box for Pure 2.0 Waters. 21 I don't know what a trench boxes. 22 MS. FUTIA: We do the bids get advertised? 23 MR. MAGGUILLI: Under our procurement policy, 2.4 the Town is required to advertise for bids to get the 25 lowest responsible bidder to purchase certain items and

equipment. Doug cannot do it on his own. The Town Board has to authorize him to post a notice in the newspaper and the like. What this does is authorizes him to post those notices. Once he gathers the bids, he will come back to us and say this is who we determined to be the responsible low better and you want to buy the trench box from them.

What is a trench box?

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MR. VOERG: A trench boxe is a federally required piece of equipment. Whenever you dig an excavation to a pipe in the trench is more than four feet deep. It's a metal box to keep the trench from falling in.

At that point, the Board will vote whether or not to award the bid to the bidder - to actually buy the box and spend the money. At this point, it's just giving authorization to go out and find out how much this is really going to cost.

MR. MAGGUILLI: Sometimes we will advertise for bids and the bids will come back much higher than was anticipated. So, we authorize a rebid.

MS. FUTIA: But there's no like special forum that the municipality has to go to. It's just in the newspaper.

SUPERINTENDENT MAHAN: Yes and it is online,

too.

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MR. MAGGUILLI: It is a requirement of General Municipal Law, Section 103 that for items in excess of a certain dollar amount the Town is required to advertise for bids. That's to prevent favoritism and make it a fair playing field.

MR. VOERG: This was a budgeted capital purchase from last year. It was something that was identified by federal law for us to own. We brought it to the Budget Committee. We did some research and found out how much it cost and discussed it with the Budget Committee to prove this and now it's in the budget and now we are going forward with the process to actually purchase it.

MR. MAGGUILLI: Resolution 83 is authorizing

Doug to advertise for bids to purchase a new utilities

truck for Pure Waters. Resolution 84 is authorizing him

to advertise for a pipe bridge rehabilitation project.

Resolution 85 is to advertise for bids for the pollution control Plant clarifier rehab project.

Resolution 86 is advertising for bids in connection with purchase for the new dump truck for Pure Waters.

MR. VOERG: Those are all capital equipment or project expenditures that have already been approved in

the budget.

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SUPERINTENDENT MAHAN: Capital plans - their estimated five years out. We do a five-year lookout for capital.

MR. MAGGUILLI: Resolution 87 is authorizing

Paula to sign amendment number one to the engineering

agreement with Weston and Sampson. This is really change

order. They can call it an amendment if they like. It's

a change order but it is a valid change order.

It's based on the fact that after we awarded the project, two pipes collapsed requiring the repair before the remainder of the work could proceed. The cost will not exceed \$16,913. It will increase the total contract amount to \$112,413.

Chret, anything you would like to add to that?

MR. VOERG: No, but I'm here if anyone has any questions.

MR. MAGGUILLI: Resolution 88 is declaring an emergency in connection with a collapsed sanitary sewer at 3 Red Oaks Drive by ANJO Construction.

This work was performed on 12/27 of last year at a cost of \$8,735. What happened was the pipe collapsed - the sewer pipe collapsed. When that happens, there are no toilets, there are no drains and

so typically these pose an immediate emergency we have to go in and repair them. It's not a situation where we can take the time to advertise for bids because people at 3 Red Oaks Drive would be very unhappy. That's why you see these types of Resolutions.

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Resolution 89 - we have a similar situation. This is that Osborn Road and Byers Place. The clay pipe completely collapsed and this is rather high. We don't usually get an emergency repair, but the damage was extensive; \$70,641.12.

The necked is the repair of the sanitary sewer at 2 Austin Drive. This is a fiber pipe that completely collapsed. The repair work was done December 10; \$6,318.52. The funds for this come from budgeted amounts that are placed in our emergency repair reserve fund that the Budget Committee adopts every year.

MR. GREEN: We're not looking too good to start up the year, are we?

MR. VOERG: We're trying to wrap up 2019.

MR. MAGGUILLI: Resolution 91 is we are authorizing Paula to sign an engineering agreement with VHB Consulting. This is for general engineering services for the year. This is an as needed contract and we are authorizing a contract not to exceed \$10,000. The terms

and conditions are subject to the approval of the Town Attorney's office. We do this as a general contract. In the past, they were all open ended. What we have done is we have placed a limit on these. It's not to exceed \$10,000. If the consulting services were to exceed that, Chret would have to come back and explain to us why we need additional services above \$10,000. That has worked out very well to keep the cost down on these types of things.

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Resolution 92 is amending the fee schedule for the Youth Services Division. All this does is for the pickle ball classes - it goes from five dollars to seven dollars. It is an increase.

You wouldn't believe how popular pickle ball is.

Next we have an agreement with the Upper Hudson Library System. This is a three-year agreement. We enter into these routinely. The Upper Hudson River Library System provides our library with various services such as library animation services, our digital collection and the like. The fee for the 2020 amount is based on our 2019 fee which was \$42,903. We are adding 2% to that. For the balance of the two years we will negotiate when they come up. Right now, the contract reads to be determined. When 2022 comes

up, they will come back and we will be back in front of the Board at that time.

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Resolution 94 is appointing Daniela Weiss to the Community Development Citizen Advisory Committee. Her term will expire December 31, 2022.

Resolution 95 is something that we do approximately every 4 to 5 years, I believe. This is for Community Development Block Grant and HOME program. This is required by the Department of Housing and Urban Development's. We have to have a public hearing on how the funds are received from HUD and will be spent by the Town. What this Resolution is doing is we are calling for the public hearing on March 4, 2020 at 7 p.m. Ms. Adriano will be speaking at that public hearing.

Resolution 96 is authorizing Chief Kostyun and Assistant Chief Sugrue and Assistant Chief Rench to execute a non-disclosure agreement with Stryker Medical. This is an agreement at no cost to the Town. It's essentially a non-disclosure agreements with Stryker. There the people that supply our cardiac monitors and we are doing a study with them.

Is that fair to say?

MR. KOSTYUN: As part of the capital plan, we will be replacing our monitors over the next couple of

years and they have some new technology that they would like to expose us to, but it hasn't made it to press yet so they just don't want us talking about it.

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MR. MAGGUILLI: They want the information confidential, at this point. We have no problem doing that. It doesn't cost the Town anything. The terms of the agreement are subject to the Town Attorney's office approval.

Resolution 97 is authorizing Paula to sign a contract with David Frueh Contracting. This is for interior demolition work at 12 Arrowhead Lane. The cost is \$8,500.

The FBI has rented 12 Arrowhead from us to conduct training. They will actually be paying the cost because structured instead of the contract. The contract originally come through us and because we own the building. The actual expense will be paid for by the federal government.

Resolution 98 is authorizing Paula to sign an agreement with Mohawk River Humane Society. This is again what I call a housekeeping Resolution. We do these every year and this is for our Police Department and this is for housing dogs, cats and the like.

Various fees apply. It's a complicated contract.

To give you an example, it's \$70.35 a day or

partial day for the initial impound. Which can be 5 to 7 days for a dog. It's a little bit less for cat.

Other fees apply for euthanasia services and cremation services.

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Our Police Department which includes animal control, of course, will use both them and Latham Animal Hospital. Latham Animal Hospital has a different fee schedule because they don't provide exactly the same services.

As example, it's \$30 a day to board a dog and \$25 a day to board a cat.

Resolution 100 is authorizing Paula to sign a service agreement with Eclipse Network. This is for the Police Department in this is to maintain our video surveillance system at the Public Safety building. The cost is \$3,652. The contract will run from March 12, 2022 March 11, 2021.

Resolution 101 is an extended warranty coverage with ELSAG North America. Again, this is for the camera system at Central Avenue and Fuller Road - the license plate reader. It's worked out very well for our Police Department so far. The cost is not to exceed \$3,980. For that, they maintain it. If anything goes wrong, they will come in and fix it.

Resolution 102 is authorizing Paula to sign

an agreement with Pettinelli Recreation, Inc. and Miracle Recreation Equipment Company and this is for the purchase and installation of new playground equipment for a new playground area at the Crossings. The cost will be \$96,390.02. This is going into the south part of the Crossings.

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SUPERINTENDENT MAHAN: They can have a new playground there. There is no playground. There is some parking. This is through a grant through Phil Steck.

Also, there is some public benefit money from a project that Crisafulli did on Aviation. That's where the money is coming from.

MR. MAGGUILLI: So, it's partially by a grant and partially from fees that are paid under our planned development district requirements for public benefit.

Resolution 103 is an agreement with Upstate Companies One LLC. This is to build a new pavilion at the Mohawk River Park. The cost will be \$240,815.12.

This is not bid because we were able to do it through New York State contracts and we are piggybacking on the Town of Greece. Doug did bid it initially and what we found was by piggybacking on the Town of Greece New York State contract we save \$40,000 from the lowest bid.

SUPERVISOR MAHAN: There's also grant money -

this is at the park on Schermerhorn Road. We do the Easter Seals camp there for the kids. It goes way back in the Town's history. This is a new pavilion that they need at this point. They have outgrown the old one. It also provides some ventilation with fans and lights so it's a lot healthier for them as well. When their camp is not in session, the Parks Department will rent it out if it's feasible to do it at the time.

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MR. MAGGUILLI: Resolution 104 is change order number one with the contract with New Castle Paving.

This is for the Albany County interconnection project.

There was a design issue along Route 155 and environmental issues that were not foreseen at the time the contract was entered. However, this is a no cost change order. They're looking to extend the final completion date which was April 30, 2020 to July 1, 2020. The Town departments didn't have any problem with that.

SUPERVISOR MAHAN: This is a new backup system that we are doing as a partnership with the City of Albany. Our backup system currently is the Stony Creek Reservoir in Clifton Park. It's very old and it's very costly and it's not very efficient anymore. This system will allow us to provide them water if they need it and they can provide us water if we needed in a much more

efficient manner. It's basically a turn of the valve, according to John Frazier.

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We actually used the system to provide water for the city back in December they had an emergency. It actually connects two more parts of the county other than just Albany and Colonie. We each received a grant of about \$960,000 for the project. There is a little bit over that that we will put in. This particular project will serve as a backup for years to come for the Town.

Then you have the situation were now you have the Stony Creek Reservoir and that will have to be addressed at some point in time. John does not believe that we will need it. We are pretty close to finishing the project. I think were waiting for a pump for our side.

So, we have some ideas and maybe talking to DEC or the Open Space Institute. It's almost 1,000 acres. I think 365 acres is water.

MR. MAGGUILLI: It's beautiful land and it is in Clifton Park.

SUPERVISOR MAHAN: People don't know it's there. It is so hidden.

There is a possibility that if one of these - whether the state or somebody else would like to take

it, if they can have the restrictions lifted on the water it would be beautiful for passive recreation and things like that. That's all to be determined in the future.

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MR. MAGGUILLI: Right now because it was a secondary water supply, there's a 365 acre reservoir that looks like On Golden Pond. It's just amazing. You can't do anything with it though. You can't put boats on it. We do have a caretaker that watches it for the Town. It's all posted and nobody is supposed to go there. It's an incredibly beautiful piece of land.

Resolution 105 is authorizing the settlement or discontinuance of tax cert proceeding.

CapWen sued the Town to reduce their assessment at 1163 Troy Schenectady Road. We have reached a tentative agreement to reduce it by \$100,000 which would result in a Town refund of \$428.38 immediately and a school tax refund of \$4,218.45 paid by the school district immediately and then the reduction in the future. After we approve it, it's all subject to judicial approval as well. Just so you know, these are handled primarily by my office — Allegra in my office. She does an excellent job on these.

Resolution 106 is authorizing Paula to sign

an agreement with Bank of America in this is to accept our Alberts and Lisabeth Field Memorial Fund Trust distribution of \$30,000. It's a grant that the Town receives every year for our Senior Resources Department.

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Finally, Resolution 107 is authorizing Paula to enter into a five-year lease agreement for 12

Metropark Drive at a cost of \$26,460 annually. This is for our Senior Resources Department. They will be moving from the Beltrone Center. The Beltrone people requested the space and asked that the Town if we could find a different location. Metropark Drive will work out fine.

MR. FIELD: Did they increase the rent over there? Is that what they did?

MS. MURPHY: They wanted to increase to 25%.

SUPERVISOR MAHAN: They decided that. They really had expressed that they need the space and if we could move, it would help them. So, we've been looking. I think this is actually less than what we would pay if we were still there.

MR. KELSEY: We honored what Beltrone wanted. This is about \$3,000 less per year.
