

The Frederick Cramer House

Oftentimes questions surface regarding some of the older homes and buildings in the Town of Colonie. Typically, Kevin Franklin, our Colonie Town Historian, fields these inquiries and answers individual requests about the aging, historic properties within the Town. Recently, this writer was approached with an inquiry regarding an older structure, and with the help of Kevin, I was able to provide the information requested. In doing so, we thought it would be appropriate to share the information of this property with our membership through the Historical Oracle.

Situated on Albany Shaker Road, near Everett Road, is a large brick house pictured above. When was this built? Who was the architect? What style of architecture is it? We hope this article answers most questions.

PROPERTY OWNERSHIP

According to the Book of Deeds, the first owner of the property, which originally encompassed 76 acres, was Stephen Van Rensselaer in 1842. The property was then owned by Teunis & Catherine Van Vechten in 1848. Warren Kelly became the owner in 1864. Three years later it was owned by William & Susanna Van Antwerp, who kept the property until 1901, when Frederick Cramer, a widower became the owner. In 1925 the 76 acres was acquired by Jacob Krug, and in 1982 the property was owned by John and Anthony Audi, who resided on Exchange Street.

NOTE: Stephen Van Rensselaer, Teunis & Catherine Van Vechten, William & Susanna Van Antwerp and Frederick Cramer are all buried in Albany Rural Cemetery in the Town of Colonie.

HISTORICAL & ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

A review of the Building Structure Inventory Form dated June 11, 1982, reveals that the building was known as the **Frederick Cramer House**, located at 410 Albany Shaker Road in Loudonville.

The Frederick Cramer House is significant to the history of the Town as a distinctive example of post Civil War picturesque eclectic farmhouse architecture. Designed in 1877 by a prominent Albany architect, Ernest Hoffman, Jr., the house exhibits Victorian Gothic and Eastlake style details applied to a traditional central hall, two-story farmhouse form, but it was an unusual example of an architect designed farmhouse. Why? Because while many picturesque farmhouses were built to pattern book designs, only a few of the most prosperous farmers actually called upon the services of an architect. Built amid the late nineteenth century suburban development, the Frederick Cramer House and outbuildings reflect the prosperity and success that distinguished the Town of Colonie as an important agricultural provider for the growing urban community of Albany.

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INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING & SURROUNDINGS:

In 1982 the property consisted of a farm house, farm fields and a vegetable stand. Despite the surrounding suburban residential neighborhood, the Frederick Cramer House at 410 Albany Shaker Road continued to retain a farm-like setting. Following subdivision during the twentieth century, the property's approximately four acre parcel was all that remained of the farm yard's original 76 acres.

The two story brick farmhouse was designed in the Victorian Gothic style. The house is "T" shaped: the front section is five bays wide and has a one story enclosed portico at the center entrance. All windows have stone heads and lentels. The gable roof of the front section has a central cross-gable, two gable dormers, and two symmetrically placed end chimneys. The gable ends, dormers and eaves are ornamented with massive wood trim that resembles structural members. The gable ends also have foliated wooden decorations and trim work consisting of pendants and finials. The front portico was added on in 1940.

The interior of the house retained the paneled, double front doors, grain-painted woodwork, and the finely carved and turned black walnut newel and balusters. By the time of the Building Structure Inventory Form in 1982, the house had been segmented into apartments.

Two clapboard barns, a clapboard shed and a concrete block garage were situated behind the house, and a vegetable stand was situated near Albany Shaker Road on what is now an empty lot on the south side of the property. South of the vegetable stand stood an old gas station, now the site of a Stewarts Shop on the corner of Albany Shaker and Everett Road.



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
