Now that we have arrived into the summer season, I can't help but reflect on how quickly the first seven months of my service as Town Supervisor has passed. I took office back in January with a humbled sense of gratitude and responsibility to protect and enhance our quality of life here in Colonie every day. While we have made great strides in this short time, I am excited and motivated to keep moving forward to maintain our reputation as a premier location to live, work, and raise a family in the Capital District.

Working in conjunction with our dedicated department heads and their staff, we have focused our energy identifying both short and long term goals that will have a meaningful impact on residents town wide. One major example is my concentrated effort to improve the safety and structure of our Town roads. As soon as the weather allowed, we embarked on the most aggressive road repair program ever undertaken in our Town. We will continue this practice each year in order to catch up.

The Town enjoys 850 acres of park space that provide a variety of opportunities to be outside and experience the natural beauty of our community. I have made it a priority to rejuvenate many of these areas and preserve their availability for years to come. We are currently in the process of rebuilding Kiwanis Park on Route 2 and have already dedicated over 40 acres to the Albany Pine Bush. Our Mohawk River Park is also overdue for an upgrade and overhaul of available services.

For the first time, the Colonie Town Pool and Splash Pad opened for Memorial Day weekend and will remain open through Labor Day with extended hours to allow town residents more opportunities to utilize this fantastic resource to stay cool and enjoy the summer season close to home.

Our Town Police, Fire and EMS professionals are dedicated to the protection and safety of our residents and visitors. Their tireless devotion provides us all the freedom and peace of mind to take advantage of so many wonderful opportunities to gather with friends and family. I thank them for their service and appreciate their single-minded allegiance to safeguard our treasured community.

It is an honor to serve as your Town Supervisor and I look forward to continuing to build on our accomplishments in the days and weeks ahead. Together we will work to build a better Colonie. If I can be of any assistance, my office stands ready to help. I wish you all a happy, safe and memorable summer.

SUPERVISOR CRUMMEY

DELIVERS 2022 STATE OF THE TOWN ADDRESS

Earlier this year Supervisor Peter G. Crummeley delivered his State of the Town message to the Capital Region Chamber and at a Town Board meeting. Key points are summarized below.

We have set an energetic and dynamic course to build a better Colonie. While I serve daily at Town Hall, or at any one of our town facilities, I could not enjoy the success of what we have already achieved without the unwavering support of our Colonie Town Board. Deputy Town Supervisor Rick Field, together with fellow Town Board members, Danielle Futia, Alvin Gamble, Melissa Jeffers, Jeff Madden and Jill Penn have served collectively with me in getting the job done.

Our Colonie Police Department continues to serve with distinction. We will strive to be at full staff this year utilizing the most up to date policing technologies and techniques available. These policing techniques get the right help, for the right people at the right time.

Our Emergency Medical Services continues to deliver award winning services, recently receiving the Lifetime Gold Plus Award from the American Heart Association for exceptional care in patients having heart attacks and strokes.

Our volunteer fire service continues to be an essential part of our public safety. Twelve departments serve our Town and each with distinction and commitment. We do not have to look very far to see examples of exceptional service by our volunteer fire departments.

As for our infrastructure, it is imperative that we take bold steps to address our aging infrastructure. Colonie has approximately 1300 town roads consisting of approximately 330 miles. It is unquestioned that we must step up our highway maintenance. This year, we have embarked on the most ambitious town road repair plan in Colonie's history. Clearly, there are more roads requiring assistance that we can wholly repair in one year, but you will see evidence of road work throughout the Town this year.

As to our Latham Water District, it maintains approximately 440 miles of pipe. Two thirds of the pipe is cast iron which was the typical pipe utilized during the applicable installation period. Cast iron does not flex so it can easily break under pressure. We are moving forward with pipe replacement in some of our most challenged areas.





As to our parks, with the support of our Town Board, I have directed the immediate rebuild of the Kiwanis Park on Rt 2. Further, I have proposed a deep dive into our Mohawk River Park. Our Town river frontage is currently not accessible for watercraft, even though the park was originally served with a boat launch. Colonie residents should once again enjoy direct access to the Mohawk River. The tennis courts there have been deemed unusable for too many seasons. We are renovating that area this year to provide new park opportunities to our town residents. We opened the pool earlier than ever before and it will stay open through Labor Day.

Our green initiatives are already underway; our Town board dedicated forty-one acres to be preserved and maintained by the Albany Pine Bush Commission expanding their environmental holdings to roughly 3400 acres. In addition, I have asked our Climate Smart Communities Task Force to achieve climate smart community designation for our Town in this calendar year.

You may have noticed new welcome signs as you enter our Town, welcoming travelers to Colonie – “a great place to live, work and play.” I work each day to keep these words true.

Colonie Police

In our continuing efforts to engage the community in positive ways, we provided residents the ability to pick up COVID test kits and masks on several occasions. Officers have been able to hand out thousands of test kits and masks.

The Colonie Police Department is committed to serving the residents of Colonie. We are always looking for excellent candidates to serve as Police Officers and Public Safety Dispatchers. We expect to hire several officers and dispatchers this year to fill current or expected vacancies. Colonie Embarks on an Aggressive Road Paving Program

Under Supervisor Crummey’s leadership, the Town Highway Department has initiated the largest and most ambitious paving program in Town history incorporating 88 roads that encompass over 20 miles. The program is off to an excellent start with many of the designated streets already re-conditioned. In addition to paving roads, the Highway Department is sweeping our Town roads. The Department also began the 2022 Storm Sewer Rehabilitation Program, which includes cleaning and repairing over 30 catch basins.

Streetlights

The Town has begun the replacement of over 4,000 streetlights with compact, efficient and powerful LED (Light Emitting Diode) lights which will not only result in up to a 50% reduction in streetlighting electric costs but will also provide better lighting and significantly reduce greenhouse gas production associated with generating the electricity needed to power the lights.



Colonie celebrates Arbor Day and Town Conservation Efforts

For the sixth year in a row, the Town of Colonie has been named a Tree City USA by the Arbor Day Foundation in honor of its commitment to effective urban forest management. Town Supervisor Peter Crummey celebrated the achievement on Friday, April 29 in front of Memorial Town Hall by issuing a proclamation, unveiling a new Tree City USA sign, and raising the Tree City USA flag over Town Hall. He was joined by members of the Town Board, Conservation Advisory Council, and residents to mark this special occasion. “Our Town is able to earn this designation because we have so many residents that are dedicated to preserving the character of our community and understand the intrinsic value of planting and caring for our trees. We will continue to embrace sustainable environmental policies that will protect the natural beauty of Colonie for generations to come” said Colonie Supervisor Peter G. Crummey.



Practice Pollution Prevention

Stormwater runoff is rain that falls on roofs, lawns, or paved areas, and is carried away by a system of stormwater pipes or culverts and ditches. As it flows over the land surface, it can be contaminated by debris, chemicals, dirt, and other pollutants. This untreated water is then discharged directly into the water bodies we use for swimming, fishing, and drinking water.

What you can do to help:

- Recycle used motor oil
- Participate in Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day
- Use hazardous substances in the smallest amounts possible

Please recycle or properly dispose of household products that contain chemicals, such as insecticides, pesticides, paint, solvents, used motor oil and other fluids. Don't pour them onto the ground or into storm drains!

We reserve the right to refuse any material which is not deemed acceptable to the managing chemist on site.

2022 YARD WASTE BRUSH PROGRAM

REGULAR WEEKLY SCHEDULE APRIL 11th – NOVEMBER 4th, 2022

After November 4th, the Town will continue to collect yard waste, but not on the regular weekly schedule. Unscheduled curbside collection will continue through December 9th, *weather permitting*.

Program Guidelines

For ease of handling, we prefer yard waste to be packed in biodegradable bags. Yard waste may also be placed in reusable containers no larger than 32 gallons in volume and weighing no more than 40 pounds. It is no longer necessary to identify reusable containers with compostable yard waste stickers purchased from the Town.

Place the bags and/or containers at the curbside for your pick-up day.

Residents may also bring compostable yard waste **at no charge** to the compost facility at: **1319 Loudon Road, Cohoes** during normal business hours.

Through June: Monday – Friday 7am to 3pm., Saturdays 7am – Noon

July, August, and September: Monday – Friday 7am – 2pm., Saturdays 7am – Noon

Residents may pick up free compost beginning May 6

Note: Compost is not recommended for vegetable gardens, but can be used as mulch, a soil conditioner, to establish a lawn, or as an ornamental plant potting soil.

Holiday Collection

If a legal holiday falls on a collection day, pick up for all fire districts may occur on another day during that week.

Weekly collection is scheduled by Fire District:

ACCEPTABLE MATERIALS

- Lawn Clippings
- Leaves
- Plant Debris
- Hay
- Branches & brush up to 3 inches in diameter and 4 feet in length, tied with string in manageable bundles (no wire) or in biodegradable bags



UNACCEPTABLE MATERIALS

- Bags or Containers over 40 lbs. in weight or 32 gallons in volume
- Yard waste in plastic bags (including orange pumpkin bags)
- Wreaths (because of wire)
- Branches or brush not bundled with twine or in biodegradable bags
- Branches stuffed in containers
- Garbage
- Yard waste containing rocks, sod, or dirt
- Yard waste frozen in reusable containers
- Treated wood
- Construction/demolition debris
- Non-organic material, including metal of any type

The Town Board controls Town finances, legislation and policy, and acquisition of real property. It appoints all non-elected officers and employees of the Town, including members of the Planning Board and Zoning Board of Appeals. Along with the Supervisor, the Town Board creates and appoints unpaid members to various advisory boards. The Town Board also votes on the budget recommended by the Supervisor and votes budget modifications or transfers.

Colonie EMS — We Put People First

The EMS Department responded to 13,427 calls for service and transported 9,336 patients to the hospital in 2021 – an increase of 17% from last year. Personnel changes includes the addition of full and part time EMTs and paramedics. The hiring of an Associate Medical Director and integration with the Albany Med Fellowship program bring exciting changes to the Department. This now allows our Medical Director the ability to respond to EMS calls in the Town and provide medications directly to the patient, which will provide greater and faster care to our patients.



EMS also has new automatic external defibrillators (AEDs) as a result of a continued partnership with law enforcement. Each police car will now have an AED right in the vehicle, providing faster service in an emergency. Other new pieces of equipment include automatic loading stretchers, and a bariatric ambulance that can transport patients up to 1,600 pounds.

Partnering with Supervisor Crummey and the Colonie Police Department, EMS hosted several COVID-19 test sites. Test kits can still be obtained by calling EMS at 518-782-2645 and these kits are available to Colonie residents free of charge. EMS continues to participate in community outreach events as well, with programs for CPR and AED training, Stop the Bleed training and general safety and wellness. When Deputy EMS Chief Erin Kelly and School Resource Officer Taylor Warner learned of the need for supplies in the Shaker Middle School backpack program, they created and led a food drive that was so successful a classroom was needed to store the overflow!

EMS was also awarded the Lifeline Gold Plus Award by the American Heart Association for excellence in stroke and heart attack care this year. Additionally, an \$80,000 grant was provided to EMS by the NYS Office of Mental Health. This grant will allow our EMS employees to receive mental health training to strengthen suicide prevention efforts. Our EMS Department continues to be the best in the region. 2022 Parks and Recreation Upgrades

The revitalization of the Kiwanis Park is continuing with the construction of two pickleball courts and two NCAA-size basketball courts with new fencing installed around the courts. The layout of the new courts allows us more area for green space for all to enjoy. The work at the site is anticipated to be completed by August 2022.

The Mohawk River Park is in the design stage to house eight new pickleball courts along with two multi-use basketball courts. This state-of-the-art facility will include a newly paved parking area and access to the concessions stand without having to enter the pool.

If you have stopped by the Town Golf Course you will see the many upgrades already made to the Pro Shop. The new point of sale system that has been installed allows players to access tee times online, receive informational e-mails, and store any payment method they wish to expedite the check in process. The Town hired a professional golf architect to inspect the course and submit a plan to the Town with the upgrades needed to once again become a premier public golf course.



The Parks and Recreation Department is also finalizing a Master Plan to begin the revitalization of the neighborhood Pocket Parks with new tennis and basketball courts.
